## Primary Food Processors' statement on final approval by the Council and the European Parliament establishing the new Novel Foods Regulation

On 16 November 2015, the Council formally adopted the compromise text on the revision of the Novel Foods Regulation<sup>1</sup> which was voted by the European Parliament on 28 October 2015.

The association of Primary Food Processors (PFP) welcomes this final agreement with regard to the scope of the definition of Novel Food. On this issue, the PFP proposal to reinstate specific food categories (to which a food would have to belong to in order to be classified as a "novel food") to the date of 15 May 1997, was taken on board.

PFP is also pleased to see co-legislators voted to support reference to one single definition of "engineered nanomaterials". The inclusion of the definition of "engineered nanomaterial" in the Novel Foods Regulation, with the current definition in Food Information Regulation<sup>2</sup> being replaced by a reference to the definition in the Novel Foods Regulation, will avoid divergent interpretation and provide more legal certainty to the operators.

PFP represents the European primary food processing industries. It provides the link between agricultural raw materials and final products (secondary processors in the food, feed and non-food sectors). PFP members process approximately **220 million tons of raw materials** (cereals, sugar beet, rapeseeds, soybeans, sunflower seeds, cocoa beans, crude vegetable oil, starch potatoes...) **employing over 120 000 people** in the European Union.
